


The illustration to the right depicts the number of funds that existed before the Campaign and the number of funds created since the Campaign's inception (July 1, 2007).

# **CELEBRATING A BILLION AND BEYOND**

The largest and most successful private fundraising campaign in the history of West Virginia University was celebrated June 1-3 in Morgantown. Alumni and friends gathered for events and activities to mark the end of *A State of Minds: The Campaign for West Virginia's University*. Donors gave more than \$1.2 billion during the Campaign surpassing the \$1 billion goal. Many donors who contributed to the success of the Campaign were featured during the weekend along with those people and programs benefitting.

### Breaking Ground Moving care for children and families in West Virginia forward

In West Virginia, WVU Medicine is at the forefront of research, education and patient care. Focused on providing the highest quality care to the state, WVU Medicine works to ensure West Virginians have access to the care—and health—they deserve, with WVU Medicine Children's leading the effort in providing exceptional care to children and families.

On June 4, WVU Medicine Children's broke ground for a new eight-story, 155-bed facility that will include areas for registration, administration, laboratories, connections to the WVU Heart and Vascular Institute, operating rooms, Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and much more.

Helping to lead the efforts in the \$60 million capital campaign are honorary co-chairmen WVU Football Coach Dana Holgorsen, former WVU and NFL quarterback Jeff Hostetler, and West Virginia native Steve Antoline, all advocates for quality care for the children and families of the state.

The facility, described as "a necessity" by WVU President E. Gordon Gee, is scheduled to be completed in 2020.

### Business school alumnus makes major gift

As the College of Business and Economics embarks on a new chapter with plans of a new building complex and other innovative and entrepreneurial initiatives, B&E alumni like Bryan Katchur are helping to the lead the way.

Residents of Parkersburg, Katchur and his wife, Karen, are giving back to the College in the form of a \$100,000 gift to help support the new B&E building complex project on Morgantown's waterfront, as well as other

projects and programs at the business school.

## Fund created to support cancer care enhancement, honor Betty Puskar

A fund has been created to support the enhancement of the WVU Cancer Institute and other cancer clinics in the WVU Hospital System.

Recognized as the Betty Puskar Cancer Care and Support Fund, the fund not only supports clinic and patient experience enhancement, but honors Betty Puskar, a two-time cancer survivor and someone who is described as a "voice for breast cancer."

Introduced at the 33rd Annual Spring Cancer Gala earlier this year, more than \$100,000 was raised for the fund.

Funds will be used for clinic enhancement, purchasing of equipment, clinical therapeutic

activities and patient needs relating to travel, housing and meals.

"Betty Puskar's unwavering support of WVU and the WVU Cancer Institute has spanned decades," said Richard Goldberg, MD, director of the WVU Cancer Institute. "This fund gives her many friends and admirers an opportunity to

both further her work and honor her dedication. Unless you prefer to be an anonymous donor we will inform her of your support. This is an opportunity to show that, like Betty, you value and support the work that we do at the WVU Cancer Institute."

Puskar was also honored at the Gala with the inaugural Betty Puskar Winged Victory Award. The award represents those who have dedicated their lives and committed themselves to the betterment of cancerrelated care, research and education for West Virginians.

### Gift will support colorectal cancer screenings

A \$175,000 donation will support colorectal cancer screenings of patients being treated at the WVU Cancer Institute.

The Barbara Northeimer Fish Memorial Cancer Fund, established by her family, will create a pilot program utilizing stool-DNA testing to focus on early detection of colorectal cancer and precancerous polyps.

West Virginia currently has an uninsured rate of six percent, creating disparity for residents in obtaining preventative care services.

The gift will provide screening opportunities to uninsured individuals aged 50 to 75 years who are

eligible based on income guidelines and requirements.

"Even though colon cancer is treatable if found early, it remains the second leading cause of cancer deaths in West Virginia," said donor Robert Fish. "It is our hope this program will lead to a significant and sustainable increase in early detection and successful treatment among uninsured West Virginians."

"Barbara and Bob Fish's years together ended when she passed away from metastatic colorectal cancer," said Richard Goldberg, MD, WVU Cancer Institute Director. "One way that Bob has dedicated himself to Barbara's memory is his support of WVUCI's research. What a great legacy to celebrate Barbara's life as an educator and prevent others from having to endure living with and ultimately dying from a disease we can cure through early detection. Many thanks to both Barbara and Bob and their family for this support."

Upcoming races for the Pirelli World Challenge include: Aug. 10-12 (Grantsville, Utah) and Aug. 31-Sept. 2 (Watkins Glen, New York).

Scott Wayne, WVU associate professor of mechanical & aerospace engineering and WVU Formula SAE advisor, said the students also plan to devote some of the donated funds toward building an engine dynamometer testing facility that will allow the team to test and tune their race engines. Funds will also allow students to attend the Optimum G Advanced Vehicle Dynamics and Data Driven Performance Engineering seminars where they will learn how to design and analyze their race car's suspension.

Dan Brown graduated from WVU in 1959 with a degree in business administration. He is retired from The Capital Group Companies, Inc. Betsy Brown also is a 1959 graduate of the University, earning her degree in agriculture and forestry. The Browns have been longtime philanthropic supporters of WVU, providing gifts over the years to numerous areas of the University. In 2009, the Browns were recognized as Outstanding Philanthropists by the WVU Foundation.

Todd and Michelle Brown have owned Rooster Hall Racing since 2014. Their daughter, Erin, played soccer at WVU and graduated in 2016.

The RHR team and driver Johan Schwartz, who recently set the Guinness World Record for the longest continuous car drift in a BMW, rely on student interns to acquire performance data during each race from their WVU-branded BMW M235i touring car. Between races, the students will analyze and compare the collected data with driver feedback to make adjustments to increase the vehicle's performance throughout the season.

# First Rural Practice Scholarships awarded at WVU College of Law

Established by the West Virginia State Bar, the Rural Practice Scholarship pays tuition and fees for three years of law school in exchange for the student's commitment to three years of postgraduate legal practice in a rural county.

Bennett, of Denver, Colorado, and Petitto, who is from West Milford, W.Va., were chosen for their academic performance and strong commitment to practicing law in the state's under-served areas after they graduate in 2020. The inaugural Rural Practice Scholarship was offered only to members of the WVU College of Law's Class of 2020.
